REPORT- UN Panel

International Women's Day (March 8) was celebrated on March 29 at I House. The United Nations Association, Davis Chapter, set up a panel of three women who spoke about their projects in other countries. I House and AAUW Davis co-sponsored this event.

Rensie Panda from Papua New Guinea spoke of her upbringing in poverty and violence, and how she overcame cultural gender negative bias. After gaining self-confidence, she focused on becoming a full human being rather than a woman fighting for gender issues. Ms. Panda is representing her country and working on climate change issues. She is often the only woman at climate conferences.

Cynthia Kellogg teaches at UC Davis. She worked on returning refugees from a Davis Sister City in El Salvador to their home from Nicaragua. She noted the results and importance of the UN in providing food, water, and protection for these refugees, many of whom were women and children. In the refugee camp, education was still important. The teaching was done from person to person; as one learned, one taught the next person. The UN negotiated an agreement that refugees could return home. They left, but had to return to Nicaragua for more years of waiting. Ms.

Kellogg feels the UN should help refugees in the United States as well as in war-torn countries.

Leslie Anastassatos, a current Davisite, was the third panelist. She has spent her career in non-profit organizations, including Sahaya International. As an active member of the Myanmar Children's Foundation, she met with women in World Learning and Habitat for Humanity. She noted that women talk to other women, and then work to strengthen and educate the family. In doing so, the community benefits. Ms. Anastassatos has also helped construct living quarters for teachers, privacy showers for girl students, and expanding educational opportunities for girls.

AAUW members Gail, Juliana, Verena, Elaine, Rhonda, and Estelle listened carefully, as we heard our mission (equal education for girls and women) repeated and put into action by our three panelists in countries other than the US.
