#### **FILM INFORMATION**

The following film is one Verena selected for its appropriateness to AAUW members' viewing. It starts at 8:00pm at I House, with refreshments at 7:30 pm.

December 16, 2016 *Mustang* (2015, France/Germany/Turkey/Qatar, directed by Deniz Gamze Ergüven, 94 min.)

School lets out for the summer. In a village in the north of Turkey, Lale (Günes Sensoy) and her four older sisters (Doga Zeynep Doguslu as Nur, Tugba Sunguroglu as Selma, llayda Akdogan as Sonay and Elit Iscan as Ece), all orphans being raised by their grandmother (played by Nihal Koldas), innocently play with male schoolmates on the beach to celebrate vacation. Observed by an elderly neighbor, their supposedly depraved behavior causes a scandal with unintended consequences. The family home slowly turns into a prison, Uncle Erol (Ayberk Pekcan) locks up the grounds and rounds up everything that could corrupt the girls further, classes on domestic skills replace school and marriages begin to be arranged. Despite the extreme patriarchal oppression, the five sisters fight back, each in her own way, pursuing their lost freedom and identities waiting to blossom, finding strength in their sisterly bond. their learning experiences, and had skills to help us with computer needs.

She speaks Spanish fluently and is a member of F.A.M.ilia, UC Davis; MAR (Mujeres Ayudando la Raza) UCD, ; Marketing and Design Committee of Davis Women in Business; and the Nat'l Society of Leadership and Success at UCD. #### REPORT: DAVIS UNA CHAPTER PROGRAM

On Sunday, October 23, UN USA Davis Chapter, I House, AAUW Davis, and Aggies for Humanity sponsored the U.S. UN Youth Observer speaker, Nicol Perez. She has advocated for social and economic equality working in the Netherlands, co-founding the Global Leadership Council, public development in New York City, and speaking on behalf of *Adopt-A-Future*, an initiative which enables UNA chapters and their communities to raise funds to support schools serving children in designated refugee camps, with matching funds.

President of Davis UNA Chapter Verena Borton was pleased to introduce this program as a great humanitarian effort. Nicol told us about the 65 million people forced to leave their homes, and 51% of these are children. She showed a short video of a 4 year old in America writing to President Obama about taking a young boy from Aleppo into his own household in New York.

Turkey hosts many refugees, but Lebanon has the most-one million Syrian displaced persons. When refugees try to come to the United States, they have a two-year vetting wait as they are processed by the FBI, Homeland Security, and the State Department.

Nicol met with other youth delegates to discuss ideas for resolving the root causes of the displacement plus addressing their current needs. Wars break out, the media leaves, but UNHCR stays to help. Host countries need safe ways to let in refugees. The refugees also need access to visas for working.

Children who are not in school can be radicalized or trafficked. The Adopt-A-Future program seeks to educate and build classrooms. A \$250 partner buys a uniform for 10 kids, \$30,000 builds a new room for 40 kids. Schools are being built in Kenya, and the Queen of Qatar is matching money donated.

Members of the audience were told that they could help by letting members of Congress know that a strong UN-USA partnership is important. We are all part of humanity and must work to help each other.
