## **UCD Student Organization**

Two former leaders of the student UCD organization are now interns for nonprofits in Washington, DC. Funke and Annie seem to be having a wonderful experience.

### **United Nations Day**

Verena Borton, President of UNA Davis, invited us to co-sponsor the October 22 event to celebrate UN Day. Mike Beard was the keynote speaker. He is the Executive Director of the UN Foundation Advocacy and Global Health. Verena explained the "Adopt-the-Future" Program (acquiring school supplies and teachers for refugee children with matching funds).



Mike spoke about "Nothing But Nets" (to help stop Malaria), "Shots for Life" (immunizations), and "Girls Up" (to promote gender equity), and the need for global programs to help move people out of extreme poverty. He urged us to become involved and spread the word locally about achieving the UN goals.

Susie Bresney is a staff scientist at the Stockholm Environment Institute, Davis office. She spoke about water resource management and energy, and gave several examples where locating water or electricity made a huge difference to women's ideas and needs versus those of men. It is important to consider gender in projects.

SEI is working to provide tools for gathering data and not just using men's views. Women need to be part of the planning process, as they talk more and think more in social terms and family needs.

Verena then gave awards honoring three organizations for community service: Sahaya International for educating women and helping HIV infected children; Davis UNICEF Campaign for educating children and their parents while raising money at Halloween; and AAUW Davis for contributions in STEM and programs promoting equity.

Rhonda, Estelle, and Shahla received a donation, as other AAUW members (Laleh, Marlene, Stephany, Ramona, Sheila Allen, Juliana, and Gail) clapped.
