#### SPEAKER DELAINE EASTIN AT STUDENT EVENT

On May 21, Delaine Eastin, first woman Superintendent of Education in California and candidate for Governor, spoke with students and AAUW members at Robbins Hall on campus. Sahiba (Chapter President) introduced Ms. Eastin as the first and only woman to be State Superintendent of Education and as such, she helped pave the way for women in politics. Sahiba asked her to speak about some of the challenges she had to overcome.

Delaine described her background and emphasized the efforts her parents made to ensure that she had a good education despite their cash poor circumstances. Learning was always her focus. She is passionate about education, and went into politics because she wanted to make a difference.

In her early education, she was inspired by a librarian who steered her to read biographies of women, helped by a nurse who saw that she needed glasses, encouraged by a counselor to take college prep classes in high school, and supported by people she met throughout her career.

Delaine's talk was entertaining, with many stories as examples to back up points she wanted to emphasize.

- 1. Women have not been allowed to fully participate, but are beginning to have confidence in themselves and with others to make changes. (women could not borrow money for student loans until age 21, whereas men only had to be age 18)
- 2. It matters that women are "in the room". Their perspective and creativity are important.
  - (a woman's restroom had to be added to the Senate floor once a female was elected)
- 3. Each person can make a difference. Be active in local government.
- 4. Be engaged, get connected, and be open to new experiences.

- 5. Education lets you make choices. Be warriors for Education. This country runs on other parents' kids.
- 6. Do not work in a place where your heart hurts.
- 7. Budgets are statements of values. We are #1 in prison spending and #43 in education money per pupil.

After questions and thanks, Davis AAUW presented Delaine with a framed certificate noting her being an EF Named Gift Honoree. The students then presented her with a flower bouquet and many words of appreciation.
