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MARCH 31 UNA DAVIS/AAUW EVENT REPORT

We co-sponsored International Women's Day with UNA Davis, I House, UC Davis Global Affairs, and the Humphrey Fellowship Program. President of UNA Davis, Verena Borton, welcomed the audience, which included AAUW Student Chapter and members Gail, Estelle, Marlene, Trish, Laleh, Annie, Mia, and Juliana.

She explained how UNA makes information available about the UN 17 goals, how the UN is dedicated to values set in the annual meeting with the Declaration of Human Rights. She asked all to look at each goal and urge Congress to support the UN fully, to be an advocate for the UN and its Global Goals.

Goal 4: Education. By donating to Adopt-A-Future, one will be supporting education in refugee camps. I House is a venue for different cultures and is a place for students to make connections. The Humphrey Program hosts professionals and fellows. Global Affairs has been involved with ten thousand students in scholarships and academic programs.

Estelle spoke about how AAUW works to empower women and girls through advocacy,philanthropy,education,andresearch. WesupportGoal#5of self-determination, equality, and the status of women through the International Fair, Sahaya House support, Tech Trek, STEM, and UCD students.

Verena then introduced guest speaker, Angelina Davydova, an environmental journalist from Russia. She is a Humphrey fellow, and graduated from the State University in St. Petersburg. She teaches there and works with a non- profit developing international cooperation in environmental and climate areas.

Ms. Davydova has been studying how the UN goals are affected by Climate Change. The International Panel on Climate Change has checked all countries, but suggested analysis and possible solutions are not easy to come by. It is extremely slow, and each country (192 of them) wants to pay \$0 for greenhouse gases. Each country has its own reasons for what it is doing.

In the developing world, how does one get growth, yet keep pollution down? Regarding the Paris Agreement, any decision to withdraw takes four years, so we are still in the Agreement. Each country decides its own target for lessening gases to get temperature lowered by 2 degrees by 2030. If there were no Panel pushing, the temperature would rise 5 degrees. States in the US are setting their own goals, and cities are working in their own ways to lessen gases.

Women and children are affected the most by the climate change, and many women are taking the initiative to make energy-saving decisions for their own households. Ms. Davydova concluded by answering the question: What should students do? First, be aware of what is going on economically. We need all kinds of professions. Answer, what are you good at? What are you passionate about? How do your answers intersect?

After heartfelt applause and thank-yous, several people asked questions one-on-one while the rest went for refreshments and further discussions among themselves.

I HOUSE FILM SCHEDULE

May 3, The Promise (2016, USA, directed by Terry George, 132 min.) A carefully researched (but nonetheless controversial) epic story set in the last days of the Ottoman Empire and around the 1914 outbreak of World War I. Rural apothecary Mikael Boghosian (Oscar Isaac) yearns to study medicine in Constantinople to become a real doctor. The dowry he receives when promising to marry Maral (Angela Sarafyan) finances his studies. Once in medical school, he meets Paris-educated Ana Khesarian (Charlotte Le Bon) who is from his region of turkey, and falls in love with her despite Ana's liaison with Associate Press journalist Chris Meyers (Christian Bale). The love triangle continues throughout the film, but is overshadowed by the historical reality of the horrors of the Armenian genocide (that is still denied a century later) in which they become embroiled. The parallels to World War II are stark.

Viewersexperienceatrocitiesprimarilyasreflected in the faces of the actors. To do justice to the lasting effects of the genocide is difficult, but it is an important story that must be told. (#447)

May 17, Das Wunder von Bern/The Miracle of Bern, (2003, Germany, directed by Sonke Wortmann, 137 min.)

In 1954 the Soviet Union was shipping the last groups of prisoners of war home to Germany. Among them is Richard Lubanski (Peter Lohmeyer), the father of a young soccer-enthusiast, Matthias (Louis Klamroth) who lives with his mother Christ (Johanna Gastdorf), brother Bruno (Mirko Lang) and sister Ingrid (Birthe Wolter) in a mining town and has never met his father (nor does his father know of his existence). Matthias' idol is soccer star Helmut Rahn (Sascha Gopel). The father, obviously suffering PTS and confused by the "new" Germany, takes out his frustration on the family and created angry reactions. The miracle of the title that changes everything is the unexpected but true fact that West Germany won the World Cup in Bern, Switzerland on July 4, 1954-and to this day that date is considered a turning point in post-war Germany. The winning goal was scored by Helmut Rahn in the 84th minute with a bit of miracle help by Matthias. (#448).

Equal Pay Day at the State Capitol: from Estelle

The picture below is State Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson, who spoke at the luncheon. On April 1_{st}, 50 AAUW members from the Sacramento region gathered at the StateCapitoltocommemorateEqualPayDay. DavisAAUWmembersRhonda, Stephanie, Leslie, and Estelle attended with UC Davis students Sahiba and Annie. AlthoughwehadhopedtohearAAUW'sSenateResolutiononEqual Pay Day, it was heard and passed the day prior to the event. Nonetheless, the day was still exciting and started with a press conference on the east steps of the Capitol with First Partner Jennifer Siebel Newsom and Labor Secretary Julie Su unveiling EqualPayCA, a campaign to raise awareness about the gender pay gap and California's commitment to closing it. Thirteen companies, including Airbnb, Apple, AT&T, Shutterfly and Square, signed onto their pledge to do an annual pay equity audit to ensure they are paying women the same as men for substantially similar work.

Following the press conference, the group met in the Eureka room for lunch. SueMilleroftheAAUWCAPublicPolicyCommitteearrangedfor severalspeakers. AmongthemwereourLegislativeAdvocate,Shannon Smith-Crowley, and State Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson (19th District, Santa Barbara and most of Ventura County), who authored the updated Fair Pay Act (SB358).

SenatorJacksonremindedusthatEqualPayDayisthedaythat coincides with the additional time (three months) it takes for women to reach parity with what a man made the previous year.



The group was then invited to tour the Capitol Assembly and Senate chambers where visitors learned about how bills become law, California history, and heard interesting stories about the furnishings and artwork in the building. Wealsohearda performance of De Colores in the Assembly chambers by Mariachi Chavez from Cesar Chavez High School in Stockton. They were guests of Assemblywoman Susan Talamantes Eggman and performed in celebration of Cesar Chavez's birthday on March 31st. While it was rumored that U.S. Senator Kamala Harris was scheduled to make a special presentation in the Senate, we never saw her as she was apparently making her rounds at other venues in Sacramento.
