EVENT October 28

The first general meeting of the UCD Student AAUW organization took place at UCD's Cruess Hall on Monday evening from 6-7 pm. The board showed a short video from AAUW National. President Sahiba Kaur introduced herself and each of the board members, who told a bit about themselves: Vice President Eva Wynn, Treasurer Jamila Alani, Communications Mia Santos, and liaison Marlene Amador. Shahla, Estelle, and Juliana were also present to represent Branch members.
