

### Sahaya Walks

<u>Sahaya Walks</u> is a celebration and fundraiser to provide health care, education, shelter and food for approximately 65 HIV-infected children and youth in the programs of <u>Sahaya International</u>. The fundraiser will provide support for the program in India and for the first time, some children in Africa will receive aid. The Davis Branch has supported Sahaya Walks for many years. This year, Sahaya Walks will be held as a virtual event on Saturday, October 9 at 4 pm and as an outdoor in-person event on Sunday, October 10 from 1 to 5 pm at the Mace Ranch Pavilion in Mace Ranch Park in east Davis. There are covered picnic tables, barbecue, restrooms, play garden for children, etc. As the organizers are trying to make this a zero waste event, consider bringing your own plates, cups, and utensils. As this is an outdoor event, masks are not required but are recommended if you are close to others. <u>Registration</u> is free and covers both events.

### September Book Group Recap


The book group met on September 11th to discuss *Caste:* The Origins of Our Discontents by Isabel Wilkerson. The group had read an earlier work by Wilkerson, titled The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration, and were inspired to continue learning about Black history presented through stories that were not taught in school. The stories told in Caste were about real people and were thoroughly researched, comparing race and class in America to caste systems in India and Nazi Germany. The group felt that Caste was a bit academic, whereas The Warmth of Other Suns contained more readable stories

Leader Karen asked which episode stayed in our minds. Participants mentioned the airplane attack; the boy on the baseball team not being allowed to swim with the team in the community pool; the disallowing of Blacks to re-enact slaves retaking a house. The group observed that we don't have as much diversity in Davis as in places like Sacramento and Esparto. More equitable opportunities for housing could help increase diversity. Also, providing children with experiences in different living situations at a young age is helpful when they can learn about people without preconceived notions or biases. Karen has observed that real estate paperwork has become less biased since negative provisions can now be removed from property title documents. Helen pointed out that even in the "north", where she grew up, she experienced many instances in school where black and white students could not mix, from the viewpoint of both races. We agreed that we all need to bring our own biases to light. It is easier to aspire to change if you can see injustices around you.

The group will meet by Zoom on Saturday, October 9th at 9 am to discuss *Hamnet* by Maggie O'Farrell. Please check your email for Zoom information. The reading selection for the November 13th meeting is *Deacon King Kong: A Novel* by James McBride. Karen welcomes volunteers to lead the book discussions at future meetings.

## **UNA Updates**



191 member nations were represented in person or virtually with speeches during the 76th UN General Assembly (UNGA) in late September. Afghanistan and Myanmar were absent. It was noted that only 18 women were among the world leaders to speak. The theme of the meetings was sweeping and urgent: Building resilience through hope to recover from COVID-19, rebuild sustainably, respond to the needs of the planet, respect the rights of people, and revitalize the United Nations. Easier said than done, but a reminder that we can choose the future we want.

**General Assembly president Abdullah Shahid** reported that New York City's mobile vaccine van parked in front of the UN during the big week vaccinated 93 attendees while 843 attendees used the van's free testing service.

As of October 1, Jordanian **Sima Sami Bahous** is head of **UN Women**. Former UN Women staffers sent her an outspoken letter saying "UN Women's task is to disrupt patriarchal power in the UN, in countries, and internationally, via the ways it delivers support, programs and policy initiatives."

On September 24 the United Nations Associations of California, Oregon, Washington and Hawaii presented a one-hour informational webinar about the history, aims and functions of the UN's annual COP (Conference of Parties) gatherings, in preparation for the October 1

### Feeling the Heat: Expectations for UN 26th Climate Conference (COP26) Forum.

The Forum presented a wealth of information and inspiration, featuring speakers from many different backgrounds in government, academia and NGOs, with a great number of youth voices. Organizers had received 500 registrations, but it is hoped that many more will avail themselves of the recordings of both the preparatory one-hour webinar and the 3.5-hour Forum.

Organizing this event was a remarkable accomplishment by volunteers and a wonderful example of the possibility of coordinating efforts across the region and beyond, fueled by passionate concerns about the existential threat of climate change and the urgent need to take action. A follow-up program is planned for November 20 to report on what happened at COP26 and plans going forward. UNICEF: Davis' longstanding tradition of supporting UNICEF under the umbrella of the UNA chapter is taking on a different form. Start cleaning out your closets and garages for the Davis Branch Fall Yard Sale to be held on Saturday, October 23rd! Profits from the yard sale will be allocated to our Tech Trek and Branch Projects funds. We are now looking ahead to 2022-2023 to provide scholarships for four incoming 8th graders to attend the UCD Tech Trek camp. The Branch Fund supports our Mission in a variety of ways, including providing funds for our UCD Student Organization members to participate in AAUW leadership opportunities, offering stipends to help members attend National or State conventions, and local projects like Sahaya Walks. The Board can also direct those funds to supplement a Tech Trek scholarship or an AAUW Funds donation.

What to donate? Please be sure that donated items are clean and gently used. Items should be priced except for the items that are grouped. Popular items include tools, jewelry, bicycles, toys, and student-oriented furniture. If you are not sure how to price items, this article may be helpful: Learn the Dos and Don'ts of Garage Sale Pricing Yard sale tags are available locally at the Dollar Tree store (for \$1) or at OfficeMax. Costume jewelry will sell for \$0.50 to \$1; however, nicer items (e.g. a pair of sterling silver earrings purchased for \$30 or more), might sell for \$10 to \$12 at a yard sale. Items that will be grouped and not individually priced include: paperback books, hardbound books, CDs, DVDs, cups/glasses, plates (\$.50), flatware, kitchen utensils, and plush toys. Clothing will be group priced (tops, pants, children's shoes, etc.). If you feel an item has greater value (e.g., 100% silk blouse), you may price it accordingly. Any items that are not sold at the end of the sale will be donated to a charity such as Goodwill or the SPCA, unless other arrangements have been made in advance.

### **AAUW Updates**

#### AAUW WEIGHS IN AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL

AAUW is actively lobbying for major legislation in Congress. Two bills sponsored by California representatives are of special interest.

Women's health: Reproductive rights are at serious risk in our country now. The Women's Health Protection Act, (H.R.3755), sponsored by Rep. Judy Chu (CA-27), has passed the House and is on the Senate legislative calendar. This urgent bill would protect abortion access.

Title IX: The Patsy Mink and Louise Slaughter Gender Equity in Education Act (GEEA) (H.R.4097), sponsored by Rep. Doris Matsui (CA-6), includes provisions for more resources, training, and technical assistance to support full implementation of Title IX. Also, AAUW staff are in close contact with Miguel Cardona, the new Secretary of Education, to reverse egregious Title IX policy changes made by the previous Secretary Betsy DeVos.
