

#### **August 13th Book Group Meeting Recap**

Members met on August 13th to discuss *The Night Portrait: A Novel of World War II and da Vinci's Italy* by Laura Morelli. The meeting started with a few personal updates from members. Karen Lemcke recently traveled to Ireland with a dear friend who was researching her family history. They visited the town that her friend's great great grandparents left to come to America. Helen Thompson spoke briefly about her trip to Wright's Lake.

The book is a dual-timeline historical fiction novel about one of Leonardo da Vinci's most famous paintings, Portrait of a Lady with an Ermine, and the woman who saved it from Nazi destruction during World War II. Carolyn Van Hoecke, Stephanie DeGraff-Hunt, Estelle Shiroma, Rhonda Reed, Rose Mary Forehand, and Marti Abbott participated in the discussion about the actual portrait and the challenges of reading a book with timelines shifting between the 1400s to the 1900s. The book offers a hint of romance by some fraternizing between the art historian protagonist and Nazi soldiers, as well as one of the Monuments Men, hoping for safety. Those who listened to the audiobook said that hearing different voices used for the characters helped them to understand the storyline.

Artists from the 1400s often painted their subjects in side view as opposed to full frontal view. When a subject was painted, that image was personalized by the artist. There were three variations of the Portrait of a Lady painting based on the placement and size of the ermine. Morelli, as a serious researcher and historian, gave life to the model as an object of desire over time. Barbara Durst recommended a book titled "Leonardo da Vinci" written by Walter Isaacson, a well known author who also wrote a book about Steve Jobs. Isaacson notes that da Vinci traveled with his paintings, some of which he left unfinished. He studied the human body through cadavers and wrote private notes using a mirror to write in reverse.

#### **August 13th Book Group Meeting Recap Continued**

The discussion then turned to Hitler and his desire for stolen works of art as portrayed in the movie, "Monuments Men." In the movie, the Allies (an international military coalition with principal members from the U.K., U.S., Soviet Union, and China) from the Monuments, Fine Arts, and Archives program were tasked with finding and saving art and other culturally important items to prevent the Nazis from destroying or stealing them during World War II. Through the taking of Poland by the German-Soviet invasion of 1939, a significant number of art objects that are part of Poland's cultural heritage were stolen. Hitler wanted art, as did his personal attorney, Hans Frank known as 'The Butcher of Occupied Poland,' who gave away many art treasures before being hanged. Brief mention was made about how soldiers who experienced many atrocities of war did not want to discuss any part of World War II.

The book group meeting ended with members enjoying pictures from Helen's trip to Chile with her daughters.

The September book group selection, *A Ballad of Love and Glory* by Reyna Grande, was discussed on September 10th via Zoom. The author, a Woodland resident, joined us for this engaging meeting. Look for a recap of our conversation with Reyna in the October Spokeswoman.

We have not yet selected books for October, November, and December. However, in the interest of time and in response to members who want a break from reading WW II historical fiction, Estelle suggested *Lessons in Chemistry* by Bonnie Garmus for the October book discussion. The book is about a woman scientist faced with gender equity issues in the workplace in the 1960s. Garmus is skilled at writing with humor while tackling injustices that we, as AAUW members, are still working to change.

All are welcome to join the book group discussions, which are held by Zoom on the second Saturday of each month at 9 am.





#### **August Celebrate the 19th: Summer Travels**

Members shared their summer travel experiences at the August Celebrate the 19th Zoom meeting. Despite some screen-sharing glitches, the meeting went off as planned. The first person to share was Rose Mary Forehand, who showed her photos of sunsets and thunderstorms in North Carolina. She described making pickles, the wedding barn venue at her daughter's home, and a few family scenes. Then she shared highlights of her travels to England and Scotland. Rose Mary saw the world's largest collection of tea cups and saucers at the Victoria and Albert Museum in London and the National Trust sites in the Cotswold. In Scotland, she visited the Avebury Stone Circles and Henge. She also mentioned seeing the The Throne Room at the Palace of Holyroodhouse, the official residence of the royal family in Scotland.

Marti Abbott had computer problems and had to postpone sharing details of her latest trip to Honduras, where she volunteered for the Chispa Project.

Aislinn Sarhang, one of our UCD student interns, traveled to Italy in June with her parents, who celebrated their 25th anniversary in Rome (where they met). She shared part of her family's celebration in pictures and explained some of the gorgeous art (Vatican Museum), street scenes, special ruins of the Coliseum and Pantheon, and chapel ceilings. Aislinn also enjoyed the street cats and special gelato shops. She travels to New York next.

Sahiba Kaur, former AAUW at UCD student organization President, joined us and expressed interest in working with students in the coming year. She shared pictures of her trip to Austin, Texas. We enjoyed pictures of her kayaking on Ladybird Lake and Lake Travis with views of Austin and some opulent homes of the wealthy. Sahiba felt Austin was a good place for young people.

Karen Lemcke commented on Austin and reminded us how Ladybird Johnson worked to beautify America and had invited reporters to discuss her projects. Karen had been impressed with Austin's strong women, including Liz Carpenter, who worked for LBJ, a President who was proud of his work on civil rights.

The conversation led to a discussion of drinks enjoyed during everyone's travels. Rose Mary showed us Rose Lemonade from England. Shahla mentioned beverages from Iran containing rosewater with sour cherries and tea with rosewater syrup. Persian ice cream and gelato are also sweet treats from Iran.

Rhonda Reed showed us photos of clouds in Missouri where she entered competitions with her hunting dogs.

All happily shared their travel experiences and members enjoyed hearing about them.

#### **UNA Updates**

Building on achievements of UNA's unprecedented Western Regions Climate meetings last year, a team of UNA leaders in California and Hawaii has been collaborating in planning a virtual forum to be held on September 23, 10 AM to 12 noon (PDT): "Mutually Assured Survival: Priorities for Climate Action." Please see the Save the Date flyer to the right. A subsequent flyer with program information and registration link will be circulated for distribution as soon as available or you can go directly to www.unawestclimate.org to register.

The virtual forum is timed to coincide with the end of the UN's Climate Week in New York and before the UN's 27th International Climate Conference in Egypt (COP27) in early November. With high-level speakers as in 2021, the forum aims to raise awareness and mobilize support for the most urgent solutions to planetary warming and climate change that already threaten all countries and people (as demonstrated by daily news about climate catastrophes).



As part of the Forum a UNA Climate Declaration, endorsed by all chapters in our region, will be distributed to national and state legislators as well as concerned local leaders. During an August 31 NorCal Division meeting further details for collaboration were discussed.

A rare opportunity was provided for UNA members who could travel to San Francisco on September 8 to attend a presentation by Ambassador Linda Thomas-Greenfield, Representative of the U.S. to the UN, at the Fairmont Hotel where the UN Charter was negotiated. The topic of her major policy address was A New Vision for a New Era of the United Nations. Ambassador Thomas-Greenfield announced six principles to be promoted for Security Council members, including defending the UN Charter, engaging pragmatically with ALL members, refraining from using the veto (except in extreme cases), demonstrating leadership in defending human rights at home and abroad, enhancing cooperation and transparency, and advancing efforts to reform the Security Council by demonstrating flexibility. In advocating the underlying meaning of the Charter to serve, not to dominate, she quoted Harry Truman: "To have a good neighbor - be one."

Reminder: On **October 21** the UNA-USA national office will host a virtual *Inter-Generational Model UN* in which all ages can participate under expert leadership. No special UN expertise is necessary to be a delegate. Step into the shoes of UN ambassadors and debate a range of issues on the UN agenda such as food insecurity, children's health and safety, the refugee crisis and oceans and climate. #### **A Leading Voice on Student Debt**

Following President Biden's recent announcement about forgiving federal student loan debt, media outlets everywhere are turning to AAUW as a leading voice on this timely and important issue. AAUW CEO Gloria L. Blackwell wrote an op-ed published in the Miami Herald and spoke with Good Morning America and Politico about how Black women are disproportionately burdened by student debt. In addition, AAUW research was cited in ABC News, CNBC, Time, The Hill and more. You can also check out Blackwell's appearance on the Power Station podcast, where she talks about AAUW's importance in the fight for gender equity.

AAUW released new research highlighting why action on student debt is desperately needed—and entirely aligned with our mission. The survey shows women of color are encountering the "perfect storm" of challenges repaying their loans, due to the combination of the racial wealth gap, gender and racial pay gaps, and economic instability caused by the pandemic.



#### **Support the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act**

The Pregnant Workers Fairness Act would require employers to make reasonable accommodations to protect the health of pregnant workers, such as letting them carry bottles of water or take restroom breaks. This critical legislation passed the House of Representatives more than a year ago, but it continues to stall in the Senate. Tell our leaders that pregnant workers cannot wait another day.
